



Suffering is anything that a person or group experiences, over a prolonged period, that causes pain or discomfort. Suffering as a biblical concept can include physical pain or sickness, emotional grief, or a sense of hopelessness.






























Genesis 50:20: As for you, you meant evil against me, but God meant it for good, to bring it about that many people should be kept alive, as they are today









Hebrews 11:26: He considered the reproach of Christ greater wealth than the treasures of Egypt, for he was looking to the reward















New Testament


Luke 9:22: The Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised."



Luke 22:15: I have earnestly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer



Psalm 22/Matthew 27:46 My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?



→In Jesus, God takes upon Himself all the pain and suffering of history in the ultimate solidarity with humanity. Suffering may be the result the brokenness of this world due to sin, but God actively shares in the experience of suffering in order to lead His people through the path of suffering to glory.





Acts 2:32: This Jesus God raised up, and of that we all are witnesses. 33 Being therefore exalted at the right hand of God, and having received from the Father the promise of the Holy Spirit.



Philippians 2:8-9: And being found in human form, He humbled Himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. 9 Therefore God has highly exalted Him and bestowed on Him the name that is above every name






→ Jesus's exaltation after suffering paves the way for our suffering to lead to glory.



2 Corinthians 4:17: For this light momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison



Hebrews 11:13: These all died in faith, not having received the things promised, but having seen them and greeted them from afar



Romans 8:18-25: For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us. 19 For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the sons of God. 20 For the creation was subjected to futility, not willingly, but because of him who subjected it, in hope 21 that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to corruption and obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. 22 For we know that the whole creation has been groaning together in the pains of childbirth until now. 23 And not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for adoption as sons, the redemption of our bodies. 24 For in this hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what he sees? 25 But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

→Glory refers to the splendor of God and His divine presence.







John 1:14: And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth



Hebrews 1:3: He is the radiance of the glory of God and the exact imprint of His nature, and He upholds the universe by the word of His power



I Timothy 1:11: in accordance with the gospel of the glory of the blessed God with which I have been entrusted



→The goal of redemptive history is the glory of Godexalting and experiencing the splendor of God in His presence forever.



Fulfilment/Culmination in Revelation:

Revelation 5:9: Worthy are you to take the scroll and to open its seals, for you were slain, and by your blood you ransomed people for God



Revelation 6:9-11: When he opened the fifth seal, I saw under the altar the souls of those who had been slain for the word of God and for the witness they had borne. 10 They cried out with a loud voice, "O Sovereign Lord, holy and true, how long before you will judge and avenge our blood on those who dwell on the earth?" 11 Then they were each given a white robe and told to rest a little longer, until the number of their fellow servants and their brothers should be complete, who were to be killed as they themselves had been.

Revelation 21:3-4: And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them as their God. 4 He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away



Revelation 21:23: And the city has no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God gives it light, and its lamp is the Lamb



Revelation 22:3-5: No longer will there be anything accursed, but the throne of God and of the Lamb will be in it, and his servants will worship him. 4 They will see his face, and his name will be on their foreheads. 5 And night will be no more. They will need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light, and they will reign forever and ever



→The glory that believers experience is Christ Himself.
Christians will experience the immediate glory of God in the abiding presence of Christ when these trials give way to glory.



<u>Goal</u>: To grow in the knowledge of the Lord in order to <u>treasure</u> Him more fully and to <u>reflect</u> Him more accurately as we are conformed to His image.





Discussion/Sharing Time

1. What is our heart attitude when we face suffering? Is it just to "get through it" and back to "normal life"? How can we consider the purposes of God in our trials?

- 2. Life can be very difficult and suffering is very real. The question of why or the unanswered prayers can be really hard. How does Jesus's willingness to enter our suffering help us in those moments of sorrow?
- 3. What is our hope in the midst of suffering? How can we help one another cling to that hope as we walk through suffering together?

Closing Thoughts





Last month we looked at Babylon and the world's exaltation in the things of this life. We saw that exaltation by the world results in judgment and everlasting contempt by God. Suffering and sorrow last only for a moment, and the glory of God is ours for eternity. Let us too continue to cry out to God in suffering, entrusting ourselves to Him in all circumstances and anxiously await with patience for the time when He will make all things right and through the path of suffering bring us to glory.
